MINOCQUA, WISCONSIN: The history of Minocqua is rich in logging lore. Its vast wonderland of forest was viewed as an inexhaustible resource to harvest a wealth of timber. By the late 1800s, the town consisted of 29 saloons, two hotels, several general stores, and a small market to support the booming industry.

“Our town’s name was derived from the Ojibwe Tribe, meaning ‘noon-day rest,’” explained Peter Nomm, chair of the membership committee at Minocqua Country Club. “Native Americans once used the area, rich with fresh water lakes and canopied forests, as a place of rest between journeys. As the logging industry reduced its footprint, tourism took its place.”

Minocqua Country Club was established more than a century ago. “Our terrain is more similar to what you would find in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan than the rolling landscape supporting our state’s 8,000 dairy farms,” said Nomm. “The club is set in Northwoods—the boreal forest of North America, covering half of Canada. Upon completion of our golf course renovation and expansion by Ron Garl, *Golf Digest* ranked us a ‘Best in State’ design.”
