

## HAIG POINT The Island of Awe

Framed by the Atlantic, Calibogue Sound, and Cooper River, much of its 5,000 acres are virtually untouched by man.

Enjoy a winding trail ride

to the beach.

DAUFUSKIE ISLAND, SOUTH CAROLINA: The oldest worldwide boat ferry in continuous operation (established in 1150) is the Mersey Ferry that runs from Liverpool to Birkenhead, England. Originally, monks at a local monastery would charge a small fare to row passengers across the estuary. Today, the motorized 10-minute ride costs about \$4.00 each way.

Haig Point is a charming community with a footprint larger than Central Park in New York City, one mile off the coast from the famed Harbour Town Lighthouse on Hilton Head Island. With no bridge, ferries (running 18 times per

day) provide transport to the barrier island. Once on property, members then hop in their golf cart (residents are not allowed to own a gas-powered vehicle).

More than 150 years ago, construction commenced on the Lighthouse at Haig Point that would guide captains navigating the shifting shoals of Calibogue Sound. Today, the lighthouse

serves as overnight accommodations for members and their guests. "During my first visit, while contemplating joining the Haig Point team, I was fortunate enough to stay in the lighthouse," recalled Don Hunter, CEO at Haig Point. "The first morning, I made myself a pot of coffee and watched the first rays of sunshine pierce the sky. It was so quiet you could hear the proverbial 'pin drop.'

"Haig Point is the reason many of our residents work so hard in life," continued Hunter. "After a visit, opinions quickly change from *wanting* to be here to *needing* to be here. Our island is natural, non-commercial, and detached
