Under a bright moon with calm surf lapping at the beach that Mauna Kea Resort is famous for, 176 players and guests relaxed with fine food and drink and strategized for the upcoming competition during the Welcome Dinner and Cocktail Reception.

Several golf professionals marked milestones at the Pro-Am with Scott Puailoa, director of golf at The Valley Club in California, commemorating 31 years of competition, and Tom Sargent, head golf professional at Mesa Verde Country Club in California, celebrating 27 years of attendance.

"When Scott first competed back in 1990, he had a full head of hair," teased Scott Bridges, director of instruction at the Four Seasons Hualalai. "I think over the years the Kona trades blew his locks into the Pacific Ocean. >

#### Mauna Kea Pro-Am







THE HORSE RACE SHOOTOUT, an informal four-hole competition immediately following completion of the first round of the Pro-Am had 22 teams. On the last hole—Mauna Kea Resort's signature par-3—the final three teams all had birdie attempts. Ultimately, Brett Rice and Rick Rielly from Team Wilshire Country Club won \$1,000 for a job well done.



## The Big Island of Hawaii

is the youngest island in the Hawaiian chain. At 300,000 years old, it's a freshman compared to the upperclassmen of Oahu (three million years old) and Kauai (four million years old).

Before the arrival of the Mauna Kea Beach Hotel, ranching was the Big Island's major industry. The resort sits on a beach where cowboys and ranch hands would camp and fish after a day on the range.

On a flight home from Asia in the early 1960s, tycoon Laurance Rockefeller took a detour to Hawaii. During his scouting trip, he spotted the white crescent-shaped beach, fell in love, and soon afterward signed a land lease. More than 1.5 million man-hours of labor were required to excavate 60 acres of lava, landscape the land with 200,000 plants, and incorporate 5,000 square feet of marble, a mile of wood, and 20,000 cubic yards of concrete into the construction of the iconic Mauna Kea Beach Hotel. Laurence Rockefeller was quoted as saying, "We're not for everybody. We're for the fortunate few."

When it opened, Mauna Kea was the most expensive hotel ever built. Praised by travel writers and critics worldwide, it was named at the time one of the "three greatest hotels in the world" by *Esquire* and one of the "10 best buildings" by *Fortune*.

It should come as no surprise, after an exciting week of golf, there should be an exciting *finish* to golf. The total purse that approached \$20,000 in cash, prizes,

and gift certificates did not go unnoticed. Both professional *and* team brackets went to a sudden-death playoff.

For the professionals, Garret Okamura (Team Hualalai) and Trace Crowe (Team Ultimate Sack) finished regulation play at +7. On the first playoff hole, Garret played conservative by lasering a solid drive down the middle of the fairway. Trace played more aggressively and cut the corner leaving him only 20 yards short of the green. After sinking a six-foot birdie putt, Trace was crowned low gross professional of the 47th annual Mauna Kea Pro-Am.

Immediately following the professional sudden-death playoff, Team River Oaks Golf Club and Team Ultimate Sack teed off to determine team competition winners. Aggressive play was again rewarded on the first hole with Team Ultimate Sack proving victorious. *(continued)* >
