"Continual reinvestments in the community are paying dividends," said Anthony Biondolillo, assistant general manager at Addison Reserve. "I've always considered us a boutique private club in the very crowded market of South Florida. We have been recognized No. 5 out of the top 150 country clubs in the country, and No. 25 in the world by Platinum Clubs of the World."

With \$75 million in capital projects complete, there has been a renewed interest—across multiple generations—to live at Addison Reserve.

"Amazingly, about 25 percent of our residents are founding members from more than two decades ago and 25 percent of our membership has joined in the past three years," continued Anthony. "My job is to bridge the gap between the spectrums. What you think is a fun night out, likely differs from your neighbor. Preferences really are in the eye of the beholder. When we reimagined stYr, we wanted to appeal to all constituents. During renovation, an atmosphere that was brighter, lighter, and more casual was established without detracting from those seeking a fine dining experience. Subtle enhancements have created the 'just right' vibe that appeals to all."
